SUMMER COURSE RESIDENCE HANDBOOK

PLEASE NOTE: The information in this handbook is accurate as of mid-April and assumes a return to our normal, pre-COVID procedures this summer. The information, rules, and guidelines in this document are subject to change if there are changes in state, local, or PNB company COVID protocols.

RESIDENCE INFORMATION

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ADDRESS, PHONE AND MAILING INFORMATION

Our Summer Residence is located at Seattle Pacific University's Hill Hall (building #36 on the SPU campus map at <https://spu.edu/campus-map/>). The physical address of Hill Hall (**not for mail or packages**) is:

3231 6th Avenue West
(between West Cremona and West Dravus Streets on the SPU campus)

The parking lot is behind the building, off 7th Avenue West. Information on the floor plan and room layouts may be viewed at <https://spu.edu/administration/housing-residence-life/housing/first-year-halls/hill/room-layouts>.

DO NOT send mail or packages to the above address. It should be used only for arrival/departure, visits, and local delivery by a courier (such as Instacart, Amazon Fresh, florists, restaurant delivery services like DoorDash, etc.).

The address to use for ALL student mail and packages (delivered by commercial carrier, such as USPS, UPS, FedEx, Amazon, Target, etc.), including those shipped in advance of the Summer Course, is:

"Suite 312" is our PNB group's designation in the University mailing system and should be included on all letters and packages. Please do NOT include your student's room number in the

address. Mail/packages received at the SPU mailing office after approximately 12:00 noon will not be delivered to us until the next business day. There is no campus mail service on Saturdays or Sundays; deliveries attempted on weekends will not be received until the following Monday.

Each student is strongly encouraged to bring a cellular phone, which makes it easy to stay in contact both with home and with the Residence staff. **Please be sure the student knows their cell phone number, and please ensure that voicemail is set up before the student leaves home for the Summer Course.** Foreign students should be sure that their phone will function in the U.S. or make the necessary arrangements to obtain a U.S.-compatible phone before arrival at PNB.

The phone number to contact the PNB Summer Residence staff is **206-488-7703**. This phone is carried by the Residence Counselors on duty at all times during waking hours. An email with contact information for the specific Residence Counselors assigned to each student will be sent to parents a few days before the Summer Course. These Group Counselors will give their cell phone numbers to their group members at the first house meeting. **The Group Counselors are parents' primary contacts for specific questions or concerns about their children.**

The Residence Director, David Jensen, may also be reached at dave@pnb.org or by cell phone at **206-353-8400** in an emergency (day or night) or for general questions about the Residence and student life (including group activities and airport transportation), either before or during the Summer Course. Dave's phone number and the Residence staff phone number will be printed on the back of each student's Residence identification. **Before students leave home for Seattle, we strongly suggest that they program the Residence staff phone number and Dave's number, as well as the School office number (206-441-2435), into their cell phones.** Once students meet their assigned Group Counselors at the first House Meeting, they should immediately program their counselors' numbers into their phones as well.

Documents for the Residence staff, such as permission slips, may be faxed to 206-441-2430 or e-mailed to dave@pnb.org. Documents must be sent at least 24 hours in advance of the time they are needed in order to allow time for them to reach the Residence staff.

WHO'S WHO AT THE RESIDENCE

The Residence staff includes twelve full-time adult employees including the Residence Director, Assistant Residence Director, and ten Residence Counselors, all living in the Residence for the duration of the Summer Course. We also have several additional relief counselors (all former Residence Counselors) available to assist with extra supervision and support if needed.

All Residence staff members are selected on the strength of their experience in dance, athletics or the arts, their interpersonal skills, and their expertise in working with adolescents. They undergo comprehensive training prior to the students' arrival. Residence Director Dave Jensen is a Washington state certificated teacher returning for his 30th PNB Summer Course; Assistant Residence Director Patrick Cho is also a certificated teacher and is returning for his 19th summer. The Residence Counselors are all college students, graduates, and/or current or former professional dancers. Many are former PNB students themselves, and all are returning for at least their second summer. All staff members have passed a criminal background check and are certified in CPR and first aid.

Each student will be assigned to a student group with two or three Group Counselors who live on the same floors as their groups. Although students are welcome and encouraged to talk to any Residence staff member about anything at any time, they will see their own Group Counselors to check in at dinner each night, for nightly room checks, and to check in at house meetings.

The PNB School and Residence staff's primary concern is the well-being of our students. **Parents and students are encouraged to contact any staff member at any time during the Summer Course if they have any questions or concerns regarding Residence life or the Summer Course in general.**

PNB Summer Residence on Social Media

To allow our Residence students/parents to get to know one another before arrival, we have set up a Facebook group called "PNB Summer Residence 2024." This group is moderated by PNB staff, and membership in the group is by request. Nametags

Because we want everyone in the Residence to know everyone else as quickly as possible, students and staff are required to wear their nametags at all times in the Residence for the first two weeks. **For reasons of safety and security, SPU requires that PNB students and staff wear their lanyards and nametags to all meals in Gwinn Commons throughout the Summer Course.** Students who lose their nametags should report the loss to their Group Counselor so a replacement can be made at no charge. Replacement lanyards are also available at no charge by giving the broken lanyard to a counselor on duty.

THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Seattle Pacific University is located in a quiet residential area on the north side of Seattle's Queen Anne Hill. The campus itself is safe and has plenty of open spaces for games of Frisbee, relaxing in the sun, or reading beneath a tree. It is within walking distance of the Fremont neighborhood, known for its artists, funky clothing stores, and other shops and restaurants. An easy bus ride away, halfway between the Residence and the Studio, is the Hilltop neighborhood, with grocery stores, a drugstore, restaurants, a public swimming pool, and other businesses.

ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE

Move-In and Move-Out Times

All Residence students should plan to arrive at the Residence on Sunday, July 7th between 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., and plan to leave on the morning of Saturday, August 10th.

Moving In

Residence student check-in will begin at 11:00 a.m. on Sunday, July 7th at the Hill Hall front desk. SPU Conference Services staff will be assisting the PNB Residence staff with check-in, where students will receive their SPU access/meal card and room key. No meals will be served until dinner at 6:00. **Family members who wish to join us for dinner that night are welcome to do so; however, you must notify the Residence Director by June 15th (206-353-8400 or dave@pnb.org) of the number of additional dinner guests.** Non-resident guests must pay the SPU Food Services cashier upon entry; dinner will be approximately \$20 per guest. There will be an orientation meeting in McKinley Hall (#16 on the campus map) at 7:00. Attendance is required for all Residence students. Family members may attend if they wish, but there will be little of interest to non-students. We know everyone is tired and excited, so this meeting will cover only the bare essentials of Monday's breakfast, the bus, getting to the studio the next morning, and Counselor Group introductions.

Please be aware that Residence students will have mandatory information meetings on each of the first three evenings at the Residence – Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday.

We strongly suggest that parents who come with their students leave them at the Residence on Sunday night and do not linger past Monday. This will give your student every opportunity to form early connections with his or her peers and maximize the chances of making lasting friendships that make the summer more fun and are a huge part of any Summer Course experience. It has been our experience over many years that Residence students whose parents linger for the first few days of the program, taking their children out to meals or letting them stay in the parents' hotel room in an effort to make the transition easier for the students, are actually making it harder. Much of the bonding among Residence students occurs in the first few hours and days as they meet, explore the dorm and the SPU campus together, and spend evenings and downtime between classes with each other. Students who are with their parents while this is happening miss out on those experiences. Then, when their parents leave, the students find that the social circles among their peers have already formed without them.

If time or budget constraints require you to choose between either bringing your students at the beginning of the program or picking them up at the end, coming during the last week is definitely the better choice.

Moving Out

Classes operate on a normal schedule on the last Friday of the Summer Course, so students generally prefer to leave on Saturday morning to allow ample time for goodbyes over the course of Friday night. Breakfast will be served at the usual time on Saturday and will be the last meal provided. All students must be out of the Residence by 12:00 noon on Saturday, August 10th.

Airport Shuttle

Many students arrive and depart without an accompanying adult, so we make it safe and easy for them. PNB School provides optional chaperoned shuttle vans to and from Seattle-Tacoma International Airport on move-in and move-out days. PNB School shuttles will run on Sunday, July 7th (move-in day) from **10 a.m. to 5 p.m.** and on Saturday, August 10th (move-out day) from **4 a.m. to 11 a.m.** On move-in day, PNB staff will be waiting for our students at Baggage Claim, with several staff members circulating and one stationed near Door 16, adjacent to Baggage Carousel 12. On move-out day, they will be in the ticketing area to assist our students as needed. They will carry signs and wear purple PNB School lanyards with photo ID badges and yellow shirts imprinted "PNBS" to identify them as PNB School staff members. Upon arriving at Baggage Claim on move-in day, students should contact one of these staff members to assist with baggage retrieval and escort the student to a PNB van. On move-out day, staff members will meet each van as it arrives at the airport, assist students with checking in, and accompany them to the security checkpoint. The fee for this service is \$80 one-way or \$150 round-trip per person. **On move-in and move-out day, PNB School CANNOT provide transportation for students arriving or departing before or after these hours. Please schedule flights accordingly.**

Students Arriving/Departing During the Summer Course

During the Summer Course, transportation to and from the airport by Residence staff is available for students who have made special arrangements with the School to arrive late or leave early, to leave for a family commitment and then return, or for those who experience family emergencies. Such transportation will be provided for the same fee as our regular shuttle service. The staff member driving the student will park and assist the student with check-in or baggage claim. Please contact the Residence Director (206-353-8400 or dave@pnb.org) to make arrangements. This service is not available on Monday, July 8th or Friday, August 9th.

Family Accommodations

For parents who are accompanying their students to Seattle and require accommodations in the area, lodgings near the PNB studios may be found at <https://www.mccawhall.com/plan-your-visit/nearby-lodging>.

What to Bring or Send

Students may send boxes in advance, which will be waiting for them in their rooms when they arrive. These packages should be sent to the Seattle Pacific University address in bold type on page 1. Please send them to arrive between June 24th and July 3rd. SPU does not accept Saturday or Sunday deliveries. When shipping your packages you should request delivery confirmation, as PNB staff will not be able to verify delivery at SPU. Students should try to limit the amount of luggage they bring, as the tendency is always to overpack. However, a few favorite pictures, a stuffed animal, or other decorations will make your Residence room more comfortable. A swimsuit and a dressy outfit or two will prepare you for a range of activities. Good walking shoes are a must; the SPU campus is hilly and loose shoes like flip-flops or slides can easily result in tripping and injuries. Jewelry and other valuables should not be brought to the Summer Course. We strongly discourage bringing AirPods as they are very frequently lost. There is a safe in the Staff Office where the Residence staff will keep students' cash or important documents. Any staff member can access these items for students at any time.

All Residence students are required to arrive at the Summer Course with (or ship ahead) a personal emergency kit containing the following:

- a small **flashlight** with fresh batteries installed
- three days' supply of any needed **medications** (separate from the supply they bring for daily use)
- an **emergency blanket** (mylar or yellow plastic type, available at sporting goods or outdoor supply stores for around \$5, or at <https://www.rei.com/product/813512/sol-emergency-blanket>).

These items are to be in a container such as a Ziploc bag, labeled with the student's name. They will be collected at check-in and placed with the Residence emergency supplies. They will be returned to the student at the end of the Summer Course. We suggest students also carry a similar kit in their dance bag.

You will also need a combination lock for your locker at the studio. You may wish to bring a few games, a deck of cards, books, or other activities you may want over the five weeks. Because it is easy for things to disappear in any group living environment, we strongly recommend that you keep your room locked at all times. **ALL possessions, including ALL clothes and dancewear, should be clearly marked with your name.** PNB School is not responsible for lost items. Lending money, clothes, or any other possessions to other students is done at your own risk.

The Residence staff will arrange for a United Parcel Service pickup on the Monday after Summer Course ends. Before leaving, students will be able to box up items to ship home via U.P.S. Ground Service using a credit or debit card. Shipping boxes will be available for purchase in the Dorm Store (\$5 to \$7 depending on size) and packaging tape will be provided at no charge. Students who prefer to use a shipping method other than U.P.S. Ground must make their own shipping arrangements.

TRANSPORTATION

PNB School operates its own fleet of yellow school buses operated by professional drivers making multiple daily round-trips Monday through Saturday, timed to coincide with the PNB School class schedule. The buses transport our students directly between Hill Hall and the Phelps Center. Schedules will be posted at both the Residence and the School and will change each day of the week based on the class schedule to minimize students' waiting time. The ride is approximately 10 minutes.

Private Motor Vehicles

Students may occasionally be transported in Residence Staff members' personal vehicles (in case of illness, doctor appointment, emergency, etc.). All staff members carrying student passengers are licensed and fully insured. PNB's airport shuttles, school buses, and charter buses are operated only by commercially licensed drivers with the appropriate passenger endorsements.

Residence students may not bring or operate a motor vehicle while attending the Summer Course unless arrangements are made with the PNB School Managing Director prior to the program. Even where such arrangements have been made, the student may not transport any other PNB student in their vehicle at any time. Residence students are not permitted to ride in

or on any motor vehicle with anyone other than immediate family members or PNB staff members unless written permission is on file with the Residence Director (except taxis, buses, and app-based shared-ride services such as Uber and Lyft). Students under 18 who wish to ride alone in a taxi or shared-ride vehicle must have signed permission from parents/guardians on file with the Residence staff.

E-Bikes and E-Scooters

Electric bikes and scooters are everywhere in Seattle. The two companies providing e-bikes and e-scooters in the city both prohibit anyone under the age of 18 from using an e-vehicle. Both companies also require riders to have a valid driver's license. It is illegal to ride them on the sidewalk so they must be ridden in the street, greatly increasing the risk to riders – especially those without helmets. For all of these reasons, PNB strongly recommends that our students do not use such vehicles. However, we cannot be everywhere at all times and are unable to enforce a prohibition on their use. Parents should discuss their expectations regarding e-vehicles with their students before the Summer Course.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

Fire exits throughout the Residence are clearly marked and escape routes are posted. Please take a few moments to familiarize yourselves with them. A mandatory safety meeting which includes evacuation procedures will be held on the second day of the Summer Course.

If an emergency evacuation order is given on the Seattle Center Campus, all staff, faculty, students and guests will immediately leave The Phelps Center and walk directly to the Maxwell Hotel, 300 Roy Street (one block north of The Phelps Center). A message will be posted on the front door of the Phelps Center and placed on the Pacific Northwest Ballet and PNB School phone systems (206-441-9411, 206-441-2435) as well as on the Residence Director's cellular phone (206-353-8400) and the Residence staff phone (206-488-7703) if those phones are in operation. PNB faculty and staff members will remain at the Maxwell Hotel until all students have been transported to the Residence.

In the event that Hill Hall must be evacuated, all staff and students will go immediately to the Gwinn Commons dining hall or to another location on campus as directed by Seattle Pacific University administration or emergency services personnel. This information will be posted at the Residence and on the Company, School, Residence, and Residence Director's telephone voice messages.

LIVING IN THE SUMMER RESIDENCE

Our summer home is in Hill Hall, which is a secure building (requiring a key card for access) on the SPU campus just steps from Gwinn Commons Dining Hall (#10 on the campus map), where our meals will be served, and a few minutes' walk from McKinley Hall (#16 on the map), where our house meetings are held. PNB students and staff will be the only occupants of Hill Hall. Female students' rooms will be in the north wing and the 3rd floor of the south wing; male students' rooms are on the 5th and 6th floors of the south wing. Each group's counselors will have their rooms on the same floors as their students.

Residence Rooms

The rooms are typical college dormitory rooms with bed, closet, desk, chair, desk light, and carpeted floors. A wastebasket and recycling bin are provided. The triple rooms have a bunk bed and a twin or loft bed, while the rest have only twin beds. Students may wish to bring pictures, posters, etc., to decorate their rooms. Please note that only painters' masking tape (the blue kind) may be used to hang things on the walls or doors. No Scotch, regular masking, packaging, or washi tape is permitted. Any damage to rooms, doors, carpets, or common areas will be billed to students/parents at the end of the Summer Course. Counselors may enter a student's room to inspect for damage at any time they believe it is warranted.

Like many Seattle buildings, the Residence is not air-conditioned. It can get fairly warm during the day, but our nights are cool and the rooms cool down quickly with windows open and a fan. Please be aware that SPU does not have screens on their dormitory windows. The Pacific Northwest is a fairly bug-free area, but students who are very susceptible to insect bites may wish to bring their preferred brand of insect repellent or sleep with their windows closed.

No members of the opposite sex are allowed in student rooms or halls at any time (except Residence staff and family members assisting on move-in and move-out days). Students must sleep in their assigned rooms. The SPU custodial staff cleans the bathrooms and common areas, but not students' individual rooms. Each student is responsible for the cleanliness and maintenance of his or her room. Vacuum cleaners are available for student use. Parents will be billed for any extraordinary cleaning (i.e. above and beyond normal wear-and-tear) that is required after students move out.

Students should follow Residence staff directions for disposing of garbage and placing the recycle bins from their rooms in the hallway to be emptied on designated days.

Roommate Assignments

Roommates and placement by floor are assigned strictly by gender and date of birth. Roommate assignments and information are not available until students arrive at the program (except for confirmation of specific roommate requests).

Roommate Requests

Most rooms are doubles (two students), but there are a few triple rooms. PNB School may assign students to either a double or triple. Requests for specific roommates must be submitted on the Roommate/Single Room Request form and received by May 15th. The form must be signed by the student (and parent, if the student is under 18). Matching requests must be received from both (or all three) students; PNB assumes anyone not returning a form does not want a specific roommate even if someone has requested him/her. All prospective roommates should check to make sure each of them has turned in their requests. Students requesting specific roommates are placed based on the age of the youngest student. When requesting a triple, be aware that all triple rooms are furnished with one bunk and one twin or loft bed.

Single Rooms

A limited number of single rooms are available for an additional charge. Please return the signed Roommate/Single Room Request form by May 15th to reserve a single room. Such requests will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis if a single room is available.

Bathrooms

Each floor has its own single-sex communal bathroom. Students must provide their own soap, shampoo, and towels. Bathrooms are cleaned Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays by SPU custodial staff. Please be considerate of others and help keep the bathrooms clean and tidy.

Room Keys and Meal Cards

We strongly suggest students keep their rooms locked at all times; PNB is not responsible for lost or stolen items. PNB provides each student with a lanyard for their key and access/meal card; please carry them at all times. You will need your access card to enter Hill Hall and your wing, and your key to enter your room. You will be charged a replacement fee of \$125 for any key and \$25 for any access/meal card you lose, damage or fail to return at check-out. Please report the loss of any of these items to a counselor **immediately**. If you lock your key in your room, the counselors on duty can let you in with a master key. At check-in, when you receive your key, it will have a red SPU key tag with your room number on it. Please remove this tag and keep it in the SPU envelope in your desk drawer until you turn in your key and meal card at the end of the Summer Course.

House Meetings

Mandatory all-house meetings are held in McKinley Hall at 7:00 every Monday evening. Everyone MUST attend; attendance will be taken. In the first week, there will also be a brief orientation meeting at 7:00 on move-in day, as well as a group photo followed by a safety meeting at 7:00 on Tuesday, July 9th. Additional meetings may be called as needed. We will be covering a variety of important topics concerning all residents. Each meeting will be as brief as possible while still covering all necessary information.

Daily Bulletin

There is an easel at the main entrance to Hill Hall which is updated daily with information such as event times, bus schedule changes, and other important news. Students are expected to be aware of all information posted there and should make a habit of using the main door, rather than a side door, to enter and exit so that they can check the daily bulletin each time they enter or leave the Residence.

Fire Hazards

Candles, incense, and any open flame (including matches and lighters) are prohibited in all campus buildings. Students needing to burn their pointe shoe ribbons must do so outside and away from all buildings. The use of Hot Stuff or "jet glue" for pointe shoes is prohibited inside all buildings as well. (These rules also apply to the Phelps Center.)

Staff Office & Counselors' Rooms

The Staff Office, which also serves as the Dorm Store, is located on the main (third) floor, near the front desk. Each counselor's room is located among the rooms of the students in his or her group. The Residence Director's room is #306, on the main floor near the Staff Office. Students are welcome to speak to their counselors or the Residence Director at any time, whether they are in the office or in their rooms.

Bedding

Mattresses are extra-long twin size (also called "dorm twin"). Bedding is not provided. Students must provide their own mattress pad (if desired), sheets, pillow(s), blanket(s), and (if desired) a bedspread. A light blanket and/or bedspread or duvet is adequate for most sleepers.

Internet Access

Students are encouraged to bring their laptops or tablets for use in the Residence. Wireless internet access is provided throughout the Residence. SPU staff will provide login instructions at check-in. Students wishing to use Wi-Fi on their cell phones will need to know the name of their cellular provider, as well as their cell phone number. The Residence Director can print necessary documents for students at any time during the program. Students must follow PNB School's Internet policy, found in the Summer Course Student Handbook.

Television

All student lounges have cable TV access. TVs and DVD players will be available in some of the lounges for student use on a first-come, first-served basis. The main TV lounge will be used for all movie nights organized by the Residence staff.

Single-Sex and Co-Ed Areas

Each single-sex living floor has its own lounge for that floor's residents only. Students using the lounge are expected to clean up after themselves or the lounges may be closed. In addition to the main floor TV room, there is a large co-ed lounge on the main floor and another on the south wing of the 4th floor. The 5th and 6th floors of the south wing are off-limits to female students at all times, and the entire north wing as well as the 3rd floor living areas of the south wing are off-limits to male students. All off-limits areas are clearly marked. As part of their duties, counselors (both male and female) do patrol all hallways and floors, not just of their own gender. Students should be aware of this and wear a robe or a towel when going to and from the bathroom, and keep their doors closed when changing.

Laundry Facilities

There are two laundry rooms: one exclusively for female students on the north wing of the 2nd floor and one for both male and female students on the south wing of the 4th floor. The ice machine is also located in the 4th floor co-ed laundry room. The washers and dryers are free for students to use and are accessible at all times until lights-out. Detergent may be purchased in the Dorm Store or from stores along the bus line or near the Phelps Center. Detergent pods should be placed in the drum of the washing machine with the clothes, not in the detergent dispenser. The use of fabric softener, including dryer sheets, causes slippery spots on the studio floors, so PNB prohibits its use.

Lost and Found

Items left lying around the Residence will be placed in Lost and Found, located in the Staff Office. Ask a counselor if you would like to look for a missing item. To encourage us all to pick up after ourselves, there is a 25¢ charge to claim an item from Lost and Found. This charge applies to both students and staff.

Mailing Services

SPU's campus post office is located at 323 W. Nickerson Street (building #78 on campus map) and is open Monday-Friday from 8-5. There is an outgoing mail box in the lobby of the Residence (collected Monday through Friday) and postage stamps may be purchased from the counselors on duty in the Dorm Store.

Campus Security

The SPU campus and dorms are patrolled 24 hours a day by uniformed security officers. SPU's Campus Safety and Security office is open 24 hours per day and is located at 601 West Emerson Street (building #61 on campus map), just one block down from our Residence. Their general phone number is 206-281-2922 and their emergency number is 206-281-2911.

Church Services

On Sundays, there is a Protestant service at 10:00 at the First Free Methodist Church on campus. Students may check out in a group at 9:40 and walk. Off-duty counselors are sometimes available to drive groups of students to other houses of worship; if interested, students should ask their group counselors. Unfortunately, church services may conflict with meal times in the dining hall. Cereal, oatmeal, milk, and juice are available for sale in the Dorm Store when the dining hall is closed.

Library

The Library (building #14 on campus map) is located just across from the Gwinn Commons dining hall. Library hours are Monday-Friday 8:00 to 6:00 and Saturday 10:00 to 6:00.

Other Campus Facilities

The campus convenience store, bookstore, and cash machine are also available for the use of PNB Summer Course students during their regular business hours.

MEAL TIMES AND FOOD

Meals will be served in the Gwinn Commons dining facility (building #10 on campus map), about 100 yards from the Residence. Standard Meal times are as follows:

Breakfast: 7:00 to 8:30 Monday – Friday
 7:30 to 9:00 Saturday – Sunday

Lunch (Sunday only): 12:00 to 1:00

Dinner: 6:00 to 7:00 daily

Meal times will be extended when there are large numbers of other groups on campus or when our class schedule requires an earlier start. Meal times are always posted on the Daily Bulletin at the front door of the Residence. Students make their own sack lunches from the lunch buffet during breakfast. We will often be sharing the dining area with other conference groups, so please be considerate and dress as you would to eat in a restaurant. Be sure to bus your own tables and pick up after yourselves in the dining room and all other campus areas.

Although all meals in the dining hall are all-you-can-eat, please note that SPU Food Services strictly prohibits taking any food or beverage out of the dining hall. We have arranged a special exception in order to allow our students to pack their own lunches, but this exception applies only at breakfast Monday through Saturday, and anything taken out during those meals must be inside your lunch bag. No food may be taken out of the dining hall during dinner or Sunday meals.

Breakfast always includes several hot options, as well as toast, cereal, fruit, yogurt, etc. Dinners include at least two main course options, salad bar, grilled choices such as hamburgers, veggie burgers, or grilled sandwiches, pizza bar, pasta bar, and desserts, as well as other rotating selections. Milk, juice, tea, coffee and other beverages are available at all meals. All foods are labeled for allergens and every meal includes vegetarian and gluten-free options. No prior notification is required for vegetarian or gluten-free options; however, for purposes of menu planning and ordering, students with food allergies or requiring a strictly vegan diet must indicate these requirements on the Vegan Diet Request and Food Allergy Reporting Form included in your information mailing. Because SPU plans menus in advance of our arrival, students may not change their meal preference to "Vegan" during the Summer Course.

Refrigerators and Cooking

There is a full-sized refrigerator/freezer, a microwave, and a cooking range in the lounge on each wing of every floor where students may keep their own food. Food items should be labeled with the student's name. Taking another student's food is theft and will be dealt with as such. Pots, pans, and cooking/baking utensils may be borrowed from the counselors on duty. Please wash and return them when you have finished using them.

Dorm Store

The PNB Residence staff operates a Dorm Store in the staff office where students may purchase basic snack foods such as instant noodles, mac and cheese, hot and cold cereal, granola bars, chips, candy, juice, bottled water, milk, and soft drinks from the counselors on duty. We accept cash, credit/debit cards, PayPal, Venmo, Apple Pay, Google Pay, and Samsung Pay, and students may purchase Ballet Bucks which can be used to pay for group trips in the Bunheadmobile or PNB bus. Proceeds help support PNB Summer Residence activities, so we ask that students use the Dorm Store rather than the vending machines whenever possible.

INJURIES AND ILLNESSES

All injuries and illnesses **MUST** be reported to one of the counselors on duty at the Residence. If you will miss class because of illness or injury you must make sure that the School staff is notified of your absence prior to the class. Should you awaken to find yourself too ill to attend class, notify the counselors on duty before or during breakfast, either in person or by calling the staff phone. We will notify the School for you. If an injury occurs in class, notify the instructor, a School staff member, and a Residence Counselor as soon as possible. In addition, please notify your Group Counselors if you are taking any medications.

If your injury permits, you should attend class. Even if you cannot participate, you will still benefit from observing. Students who are ill should **NOT** attend class and will be expected to rest quietly in bed to ensure a speedy recovery. Residence staff will check on you each hour and make arrangements to bring you your meals if you are too ill to join us at the dining hall.

Students who miss class for any reason may not check out of the Residence that day or evening; your first priority is to rest and recuperate so you may return to class.

Ice, Prescription Medications, and Over-the-Counter Medications

Ice is available in the Residence 24 hours a day. The ice machine and ice bags are located in the 4th floor south laundry room. Reusable ice packs may also be kept in the refrigerators/freezers in the student lounges. Please empty your ice bags outside or into a sink before throwing them in the garbage.

PNB believes parents are the best judges of whether or not their students are able to handle the responsibility of medications. Prescription and over-the-counter medications may therefore be kept by the student in his or her room or in the shared refrigerator/freezer on each floor. Alternatively, they may be given to a counselor to be kept in the Staff Office and dispensed as needed. Students may not share over-the-counter medications with other students.

Transportation to Appointments

All transportation to appointments with doctors or therapists will be provided by off-duty Residence Counselors. Please note that it is not possible for us to provide transportation to recurring, previously-scheduled appointments such as physical therapy, massage, or chiropractic sessions.

Medical Facilities and Services

For primary care needs, Residence staff members will take students to one of the doctors at Indigo Urgent Care (Wallingford) or UW Medicine Urgent Care (Ballard). Acute care is handled by the emergency room at Children's Hospital and Medical Center or (for 18 year old students) the University of Washington Medical Center. Students should let a counselor know when they need to see a doctor; we don't know you as well as your parents and it may not be obvious to us that you are not feeling well if you do not tell us. A counselor will schedule the appointment with the appropriate doctor, provide transportation, and accompany the student into the examination room (if they wish). We ask that parents NOT make appointments for their children. If your child needs to see a doctor, they should speak to a counselor. Parents are, of course, encouraged to speak to the counselor as well.

Prescriptions for students should be called in to the Bartell Drugs store on Upper Queen Anne (206-285-1737). If your insurer requires a national chain store, please use the Walgreen's store in Ballard (206-781-0056). **Please be aware that there are currently no 24-hour pharmacies in Seattle.**

Students needing to see an orthodontist for emergency repairs or replacement of lost appliances should see a Residence staff member for an appointment with our preferred orthodontist, Dr. Nelson.

The Residence staff and School staff work closely with one another to ensure that every student's needs are met. The services of our consulting therapist, nutritionist, physical therapist, and podiatrist are all available to our Summer Course students; students who wish to see one of these professionals should speak to the Residence Director or any staff member in the School office. The PNB School staff's primary concern is the well-being of our students. **Parents and students are encouraged to contact any staff member at any time during the**

Summer Course if they have any questions or concerns regarding students' health or well-being.

SPENDING MONEY

We strongly recommend students arrive with a debit card or ATM card. There are ATMs on the SPU campus from which students may withdraw cash as needed, or they may choose the "cash back" option while shopping in a local store. (The Dorm Store cannot process cash-back transactions.) Students who bring all their cash for the entire summer should have a counselor place it in the Staff Office safe, where it will be signed out to the student as needed. Students should not keep large sums of cash in their rooms. Students should avoid lending money to other students; the School and Residence staff will not act as intermediaries in recovering borrowed money. In an emergency, such as a lost ATM card, parents may make arrangements with the Residence Director for a short-term loan to their student. Such loans must be repaid before the student checks out at the end of the program or a collection fee will be added.

ACTIVITIES

Optional in-house movie nights, parties, birthday celebrations, the Dorm Dance, and other in-house events are included in the housing fee. However, because many students prefer to plan their own activities, PNB does not include the cost of other activities in its housing charges. Students should bring enough spending money to cover the costs of spontaneous activities. We have a full schedule of optional evening and weekend activities planned (see the Residence Activities Guide at the end of this Handbook). Please note that many of these events require pre-registration by May 15th using the form provided in your mailing. The time and location of each activity will be announced and posted on the Daily Bulletin. Students must be on time; there are no refunds for students who miss the bus. Note that some activities are away from the Residence at mealtimes; students will need to buy their own food at these events unless food is included as part of the activity package. There will be a buy/sell/trade board in the Residence where students may exchange tickets among themselves. Students must report such exchanges to the Residence staff for attendance purposes. A list showing who signed up for each activity will be posted in the foyer on move-in day. Students are responsible for checking the list for accuracy and reporting any errors to the Residence Director by the end of the first week of the program. No adjustments will be made after that date.

The Residence is stocked with board games, jigsaw puzzles, Twister mats, and basic art supplies and sports equipment for students' use. An optional Craft Night is offered on Thursday evenings; there may be a small fee of a few dollars to cover the cost of craft materials. All planned activities are chaperoned by PNB staff. Off-duty counselors are usually available to chaperone impromptu activities planned by students. Groups of 5-55 students who plan their own activities may arrange transportation at a nominal fee in PNB's van (the Bunheadmobile) or bus on a first-come, first-served basis. The fee will be based on distance and will not exceed \$5 per person, round-trip. Each student must pay his or her fare before boarding (cash or Ballet Bucks only).

RESIDENCE RULES

Group living requires extra thoughtfulness and cooperation. Many students may feel they have less freedom in the Residence than they do at home; however, these rules are necessary to ensure the safety and well-being of all students, as well as ensuring the smooth functioning of the Residence and the reputation of PNB School. If any student anticipates difficulties in complying with any of these rules, they should make other housing arrangements for the Summer Course.

Tell Us Where You Are

It is your responsibility to account for your presence and whereabouts. It is not necessary to sign out in the morning as you leave for class. However, you should still be with a buddy at all times. Likewise, if you are going to the Gwinn Commons dining hall, you need not sign out. If you plan to leave the Residence after class, you must be part of a group of the appropriate size (see below) and must sign out with the on-duty counselors. You must inform the counselors where you are going, with whom, and when you plan to return. You will be allowed to check out only if the counselors feel your plans are safe and reasonable. Students under the age of 18 will not be allowed to sign out overnight or for a weekend without prior written permission from your parent or guardian. Students with such permission (and students aged 18) must let the staff know where you are going, a phone number where you can be reached, and when you will be back.

Downtown Seattle is off limits after 8:00 p.m. This includes Pioneer Square, the International District/SODO, Pike Place Market, and the waterfront.

Checking Out of the Residence

For your safety, minor students may check out of the Residence only in groups. The group sizes are as follows, based on the age of the youngest student in the group:

Age 12-14, three or more people

Age 15-17, two or more people

Age 18 may check out alone

Checking Out of the Phelps Center

If you leave the Phelps Center with a group of Residence students at any time, for any destination other than returning directly to the Residence, you must sign out on the clipboard located near the Phelps Center front door. This includes leaving for lunch, visiting the Seattle Center grounds, or stopping somewhere on the way back to the Residence. Minimum group sizes are the same as those for checking out of the Residence. Please indicate clearly who is in your group, and be sure to check back in if you are returning to the Phelps Center.

If you are checking out of the Phelps Center with anyone who is not a Residence Student, such as a visiting family member, local adult friend, etc., you must do so in person in the PNB School office (see below).

Checking Out Overnight or with a Non-Resident

Students under 18 who wish to check out of the Residence overnight or with a non-resident (family friend, relative, local PNB School student or parent, etc.) may do so only if the Residence staff has prior written parental consent on file. It must include the name, address,

and phone number of the person with whom the student may leave the Residence and the applicable date(s). 18-year-old students must provide the same information, but do not require their parents' consent. A letter or note containing all of the above information is acceptable, or forms may be found at the end of this Handbook. **Permission must be received by mail, fax, or e-mail (dave@pnb.org) at least 24 hours before checking out.** Upon the authorized person's arrival at the Residence, the student and the authorized person must check out in person with the counselors on duty. (If checking out from the School, they must speak to a member of the School office staff, who will call the Residence to confirm.) To ensure students' safety, PNB staff requires photo identification from anyone, including parents, attempting to leave the Residence or the Phelps Center with a student. Immediately upon returning to the Residence, students must check back in with the counselors on duty.

Dress Code

No visible dancewear may be worn outside the PNB studio or Hill Hall. Students must wear only street clothes (or street clothes completely covering your dancewear) when out in public, including the SPU and Seattle Center campuses. This is important to PNB's reputation as a professional training program. Out of respect for their other summer conference guests, SPU also requests that students dress appropriately during meals in Gwinn Commons.

Evening Check-In

Each student must check in with his or her Group Counselor between 6:00 and 6:30 every evening on both weekdays and weekends. This is usually done in the dining hall when arriving for dinner.

When You Must Be Back at the Residence (Curfew)

Curfews are as follows, again based on the age of the youngest in the group:

Sunday through Thursday

Age 12-14, 9:00 p.m.

Age 15-17, 9:30 p.m.

Age 18, 10:00 p.m.

Friday and Saturday

Age 12-14, 10:00 p.m.

Age 15-17, 11:00 p.m.

Age 18, 12:00 a.m.

Special later curfew privileges may only be arranged ahead of time if the Residence staff has complete destination and return information. Such exceptions are at the discretion of the Residence staff, and no extensions will be granted during the first week.

Room Checks

All students who are not signed out of the Residence must be in their rooms from 9:30 to 9:45 for room checks. Once room checks have been completed, students may leave their rooms, but may not go outside or leave the Residence unless accompanied by a member of the Residence staff.

Quiet Hours

Quiet hours are enforced throughout the Residence beginning with room checks at 9:30 p.m. (10:30 on weekends) and remain in effect until 7:30 a.m. on weekdays and 9:00 a.m. on weekends. During quiet hours, there is no piano playing, running, loud music, loud talking, or excessive noise. The Residence staff will dim the hallway lights as a visual reminder that quiet hours have begun.

Lights Out

All TVs will be turned off and all students must be out of the lounges and laundry rooms 15 minutes before lights out. All students must be in their own rooms, in bed, with their lights out at 11:00 p.m. (Sunday through Thursday) or 12:00 a.m. (Friday and Saturday). Lights out means lights out: no flashlights, no reading lights, etc. Computers, e-readers, tablets, and cell phones must be turned off and students may not make or receive phone calls, e-mails, instant messages or text messages. In an emergency, a student may be reached by calling the Residence staff (during waking hours) or Residence Director (24 hours a day).

Outside

It is not necessary to sign out if you will be staying in the SPU campus area between Hill Hall and the Gwinn Commons dining hall, but please use the buddy system. You must sign out if you are going to any other buildings on campus, such as the library or the bank. For safety reasons, all students on campus must be inside Hill Hall by 10:30 unless accompanied by a member of the Residence staff. Students may never prop open outside doors for any reason. Students must use marked crosswalks at all times, both on campus and elsewhere in the city.

Visitors

All visitors to the Residence, including family members, must check in with the counselors on duty. After checking in, visitors are allowed only in the central area of the main floor. Visitors are not allowed into the north or south wing at any time (except family members helping on move-in or move-out day). No overnight guests are allowed. Guests may join Residence students in the cafeteria to eat, but must pay SPU Food Services for their meals. While in the Residence, guests must abide by all house rules. All visitors must be out of the building by 9:30 p.m. room checks.

Pets

Absolutely no animals are allowed in the Residence, including fish in bowls.

Public Displays of Affection (PDA)

Public displays of affection create an uncomfortable and awkward environment for others and are therefore prohibited.

Off-Limits Areas

The Staff Office and all counselors' rooms are off-limits to students unless accompanied by a counselor. All unoccupied rooms and hallways are off-limits, and certain other areas of the Residence may also be designated as off-limits and will be clearly marked.

Single-Sex Areas

Any student in an area designated exclusively for the opposite sex will face disciplinary action up to and including expulsion from the Summer Course. All such areas are clearly marked.

Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment

PNB School strives to create an atmosphere of collegiality, not competition. Bullying, physical or verbal intimidation, and harassment of any kind, including cyber-bullying and sexual harassment, will not be tolerated. Students engaging in such conduct will face disciplinary action up to and including expulsion from the Summer Course.

Internet and Social Media

All students must comply with PNB School's policy (located in the Summer Course Student Handbook).

Tobacco/Vaping

Washington state law makes possession of tobacco or vaping products by anyone under the age of 21 a misdemeanor punishable by a \$50 fine and four hours of community service. The Seattle Police Department actively enforces this law. Whether or not you are of age, PNB School prohibits its students from smoking on all PNB property, including the entire SPU campus, as well as all Seattle Center grounds (including the Cornish Playhouse garden area, the International Fountain, the Exhibition Hall, McCaw Hall/Kreielzheimer Promenade, and the Phelps Center). Students disregarding this policy will face suspension and/or expulsion from the Summer Course.

Drugs and Alcohol

Any student possessing, buying/selling, using, or under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs, or any student providing alcohol or drugs (including prescription drugs) to another student will be expelled from the Summer Course. The possession and use of both alcohol and marijuana are illegal in Washington state for anyone under the age of 21.

Weapons

Any student possessing a firearm, explosive, knife, incendiary device, or any other weapon of any kind will be expelled from the Summer Course.

Theft

Any Summer Course student found to be stealing, either in the Residence or elsewhere, will face expulsion. Be mindful of the fact that borrowing another's belongings without explicit permission is considered theft.

Swimming

Swimming in the Lake Washington Ship Canal is illegal under the Seattle Municipal Code. The Queen Anne public pool is located on the #13 bus route between the Phelps Center and the Residence; students may follow the usual check-out procedures to go swimming there.

Reporting Rule Infractions

Students who are aware of an infraction of any PNB School rule must report it immediately to a Residence staff or School staff member. Those who do not will be subject to disciplinary action.

Local Laws and the Community

PNB School students are very easily recognizable to members of the SPU and greater Seattle community. As representatives of the Pacific Northwest Ballet organization, you are expected to conduct yourself accordingly. Please uphold PNB's reputation by being courteous to others and using good manners at all times when in public and aboard public transportation. You are expected to comply with all local laws and regulations, including laws prohibiting jaywalking. Failure to do so may result in disciplinary action.

CONSEQUENCES OF RULE INFRACTIONS

All of these rules are necessary to ensure the welfare, comfort and safety of all residents. Although you may be used to more freedom at home, you **must** abide by the House Rules while living in the PNB School Summer Residence. If you do not observe these rules, consequences will depend on the severity of the offense. Potential consequences include:

- Warning
- Loss of privileges, i.e. checking out
- Meeting with the Residence Director, the Managing Director of the School, and/or the Director of the School
- Call to parents by School or Residence staff
- Expulsion and return home at your own or your parents' expense. If you are expelled from the Summer Course, there will be no refunds of any program fees, charges, or tuition.

WE ARE HERE FOR YOU

If you are having problems of any kind, such as homesickness, difficulties adjusting to Residence life, frustrations with your situation, classes, or anything else, you should talk with a Residence Counselor, School staff member, or faculty member right away. The Residence and School staff members want to make your stay enjoyable and rewarding while you are training at Pacific Northwest Ballet School. Please don't be afraid to ask us for help or let us know when something is bothering you. Although our job also includes enforcing PNB's rules, our primary purpose is to make sure you are enjoying your experience here.

The services of Josh Spell, PNB School's Consulting Therapist, are available to you at no charge during the Summer Course. Any student needing to discuss mental health or nutrition issues should reach out to Josh Spell directly. Please speak to a Residence or School staff member for a referral.

We are also happy to help you find your way around Seattle. Many of the staff are Seattle residents and understand that the city can be a confusing place. We can also offer suggestions on fun things to do and to see, whether you feel like blowing your allowance for an afternoon or sightseeing on a budget.

Above all else, we want you to have a safe, productive, and enjoyable summer. Remember, we are here for YOU.
